Six Things to Know about the June 8, 2021, Primary Election in Loudoun

- Polls open 6:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m.

Early Voting Ends June 5

A Democratic Party primary election for state offices will be held in Loudoun County Tuesday, June 8, 2021. Election officials remind voters of six key things to know ahead of the election.

1. Know When to Vote

Polls in Loudoun County will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, June 8, 2021.

2. Know Where to Vote

Most voters will cast their ballots at their normal polling location. However, there are two precincts where voters will use the same alternate locations as they did in November 2020.

- **Precinct 118** – Moorefield will vote at Briar Woods High School, 22525 Belmont Ridge Road, Ashburn
- **Precinct 819** – Heritage Church will vote at Broad Run High School, 21670 Ashburn Road, Ashburn.

Anyone who is not sure about where to vote may check their voter registration card or look up their polling place and related information online at vote.elections.virginia.gov. A list of polling places in Loudoun is available at loudoun.gov/polls.

Also, curbside voting is available at all polling places for individuals who have mobility issues.

3. Know the Rules About Identification

Voters will be asked to show an [acceptable form of identification](#), such as a Virginia DMV-issued driver's license. Voters who do not have an acceptable

form of ID can sign an ID statement affirming their identity and they will be able to vote a regular ballot.

4. Know Who is on the Ballot

Offices on the ballot will include Democratic Party nominees for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, and members of the House of Delegates in Districts 34 and 86. Sample ballots are online at loudoun.gov/JunePrimary.

5. Know Who Can Vote

All registered voters in Loudoun County are eligible to vote in the primary election as Virginia does not register by party affiliation.

Loudoun Economic Development offers a suite of services through its Work In Loudoun initiative that are designed to connect existing and prospective businesses with the region's workforce. While the summer campaign is focusing on seasonal employment that might be best suited for students, teachers, or someone re-entering the workforce, thousands of opportunities exist for long-term employment as well.

"Behind every successful business is a staff of dedicated employees, and Loudoun businesses have positions available across all disciplines and industries, right now. There has never been a better time for jobseekers to find work, with many businesses paying well above minimum wage to attract talent," Loudoun Economic Development Executive Director Buddy Rizer said. "As we move past COVID-19, we welcome anyone who wants to be part of the #LoudounPossible economic recovery."

One such jobseeker is Joseph Sandusky-Valverde, who recently graduated from Virginia Tech's Blacksburg campus with an associate's degree in Agricultural Technology. After growing up on a coffee farm in Costa Rica, he is excited to combine his real-world experience with best practices and technology that decrease costs and increase sustainability.

"Farming is one of the world's oldest professions, but it remains ripe for innovation," Sandusky-Valverde said. "I'm excited to find a job where I can get my hands dirty, learn from the existing farmers and pass along the latest trends they should consider."

Early in the pandemic, many Loudoun farms actually saw a boost in sales as consumers stayed clear of grocery stores, choosing instead to buy directly from farms, roadside stands and markets. Loudoun consumers also supported the equine industry in record numbers, as a means of outdoor leisure.

Now, as farms look to carry that momentum out of the pandemic, they are limited by the amount of help that they have.

"Agriculture is a labor-intensive industry that can only be mechanized or automated to a certain point. We're hearing from a number of Loudoun farmers that are telling us that food will go to waste in the field this year unless they can hire more help," Loudoun Business Development Officer for Agriculture and Business Services John Magistro explained. "For anyone looking to spend the summer outdoors, farming in Loudoun is the perfect way to feel good and do good for your community."

Elsewhere in the economy, a recent survey conducted by the Virginia Restaurant Lodging and Travel Association (VRLTA) survey showed that 83% of Virginia restaurants are hiring, and 84% of restaurants are currently understaffed.


At a time when Virginia's minimum wage was just raised to \$9.50 and will reach \$11 per hour by January, businesses like Ford's Fish Shack are starting cooks at \$17-\$19 per hour. Waiters are making closer to \$30 per hour with wages and tips.

"After a prolonged time apart, people are ready to spend time together in public again. That's good news for restaurants and retail, but they can't expand their hours to meet demand unless they have the staff to keep the lights on," Loudoun Workforce Development Manager Nancy Evanko said. "Even if you can only commit to a part-time, evening or weekend shift, your participation is a win for everyone as we embrace the new normal."

County to Hold Grand Opening for Ashburn Senior Center June 17

The Loudoun County Board of Supervisors and departments of Parks, Recreation and Community Services and Transportation and Capital Infrastructure will celebrate the grand opening of the Ashburn Senior Center Thursday, June 17, 2021, at 10:30 a.m. The public is invited to attend the opening ceremony.



The center is located at 20880 Marblehead Drive in Ashburn. Overflow parking and shuttle service will be available at Ray Muth Senior Memorial Park located at 20971 Marblehead Drive.

Following the ceremony, the center will open to the public for tours of the facility, program demonstrations and entertainment until 3:00 p.m. The center will remain open for tours and membership sales until 5:00 p.m. Normal hours of operation and programming begin Monday, June 20.

In 2009, the Board of Supervisors approved an initial plan for a 15,000-square-foot senior center to be built in the future to serve the greater Ashburn area. In 2017, the future 5-acre site of the Ashburn Senior Center on Marblehead Drive was dedicated to the county by Toll Brothers, the developer of the Regency at Ashburn, a 55+ neighborhood adjacent to the community center property.

The project includes the construction of a 15,000-square-foot senior center on the 5-acre proffered site. The Ashburn Senior Center provides administrative and program space for adults 55+, staff and volunteers, including a small gymnasium, large multipurpose room with pickleball courts, commercial kitchen, fitness room, classrooms, game room, computer lab, arts-and-crafts room, restrooms and storage areas.

The exterior areas have been designed as extensions to the classroom areas, allowing activities to flow outside to take advantage of the natural surroundings. The project will be Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED)-certified, a certification indicating that the building meets the environmental needs of the community and will maintain an eco-friendly design.

Final Paving on Riverside Parkway Scheduled to Begin Week of June 14

Loudoun County is scheduled to begin the pavement milling, final paving and pavement marking operations on the new segment of Riverside Parkway Wednesday, June 9, 2021. The work is expected to continue for approximately two weeks, through early July 2021, weather permitting. The roadwork, which will impact the entire length and intersections of the new



Riverside Parkway project, will begin at the intersection of Loudoun County Parkway and George Washington Boulevard from the east and continue to Riverside Commons Plaza and the existing Riverside Parkway to the west.

The work will be performed in the evening and early morning hours from 7:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. and will include temporary and short-term traffic stoppages, lane closures and flagging operations. Motorists should expect minor delays at all intersections, including George Washington Boulevard, Smith Circle (east and west), Silvery Blue Terrace and Pearl Crescent Square.

Once completed, the existing traffic pattern will remain in place until the traffic signals and pavement markings at the intersection of Loudoun County Parkway and George Washington Boulevard are placed in the final road configuration. The opening of the roadway to through traffic is expected later this year and will be announced once a date has been confirmed.

Electronic message boards alerting the public to the work will be posted prior to and during the construction. Drivers should plan ahead and use extra caution when traveling through the area and follow all directions from the posted signs, road crews and the Loudoun County Sherriff's Office.

Pool and Water Safety Tips from LCFR



As swimming pools across the area open this Memorial Day weekend and we take to the water to cool off, Loudoun County Fire and Rescue Officials remind residents to be vigilant about pool and water safety. The USA Swimming Foundation reports nearly 90 children younger than 15 drowned in a pool or spa from January 2018 through May 2018, and every year about 19 children drown during the July 4 holiday alone.

Loudoun County Fire and Rescue encourages residents to follow these water safety tips and educate your family about water safety before your next trip to the pool.

FOR ADULTS:

- Children must be **actively** supervised at all times with no distractions – put that cellphone down!
- Teach children to obey the posted rules to include swimming restrictions and potential hazards.
- Ensure pools and spas are fenced on all sides with a self-closing and latching gate.
- Always have a way to call 911 and know your location should you need help!
- A U.S. Coast guard approved lifejacket should be worn for water sports such as tubing, skiing, or jet skiing. Pool toys such as inner tubes, water wings and inflatable rafts are not safe substitutes for approved lifejackets.
- Swimmers should only use recreational items such as slides, diving boards, etc. in approved areas. Avoid non-commercial items such as tree swings, ropes, and similar items due to potential unsafe conditions.
- Know CPR. [Find a CPR class near you.](#)

FOR CHILDREN:

- Ask the lifeguard how deep the water is and stay out of water deeper than your swimming skills allow for.
- Always swim with a buddy.
- Never jump or dive unless the lifeguard or an adult says it is okay to do so.
- Don't eat candy or chew gum when swimming.

- Get out of the water right away if you hear thunder or see lightning.
- When on a boat, everyone needs a seat and his or her own U.S. Coastguard approved lifejacket.

Following these water safety recommendations and always ensuring you have a means to call 911 for help can keep your family safe during the summer season.

LCSO, DEA, US Attorney's Office Announce Narcotics Investigation Connected to Sinaloa Cartel

Acting U.S. Attorney, Raj Parekh, of the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Virginia. Special Agent in Charge, Jarod Forget, of the DEA Washington Division, and Sheriff, Mike Chapman, of the Loudoun County Sheriff's Office announced today the results of Operation Angels Envy during a press conference in Alexandria, VA.



The operation stemmed from an investigation that began in Loudoun County, Virginia in 2017 and led to the largest seizure of illegal drugs in the history of Loudoun County. In February 2020, Loudoun County Sheriff's Office detectives assigned to the Drug Enforcement Administration High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Task Force seized 6.5 million dollars' worth of drugs, guns, and cash connected to the Sinaloa Cartel in Mexico. Items seized during the investigation included 50 kilograms of cocaine, 2 kilograms of fentanyl, 1 kilogram of heroin, 6 pounds of marijuana, 150 grams of crack cocaine, 100 fentanyl pills, 7 firearms (including one assault rifle), and \$1.4 million in U.S. currency.

Last year, an estimated 90,000 people died from drug overdoses nationally, mostly from opioids -- an increase of around 27% from the previous year. "Unfortunately, Maryland, Virginia, and Washington, DC accounted for almost 5,000 of those opioid overdose deaths. We seized enough Fentanyl to kill every man, woman, and child in Loudoun County- two times over," said Loudoun County Sheriff Mike Chapman. In Loudoun County, there have been five suspected opioid fatalities in 2021 (as of April 15), with two opioid fatalities investigated during the same time-period in 2020.

Since May 2017, investigations under Operation Angels Envy led to the identification and takedown of seven independent, violent drug trafficking organizations operating in the Washington D.C. metropolitan area; their Los Angeles-based transportation network, which used tractor-trailers and shipping crates to move ton quantities of methamphetamine, heroin, fentanyl, and other drugs across the country; and their Sinaloa Cartel supply cell. These drug trafficking organizations would then transfer profits and trafficked firearms back to the Sinaloa Cartel. Investigations into the takedown of the transportation network and supply cell led to the identification and takedown of other violent drug trafficking organizations in California, Missouri, Ohio, New England, and New York.

These drug trafficking organizations distributed hundreds of kilograms of deadly drugs, like fentanyl and methamphetamine, throughout the Washington D.C. metropolitan area, monthly. Their transportation network supplied them with ton quantities of methamphetamine, heroin, fentanyl, and other deadly drugs, which they shipped into D.C., Maryland, and Virginia communities by way of tractor-trailers and shipping crates. In return, these drug trafficking organizations returned profits and trafficked firearms back to the Sinaloa cartel.

“Much like these drugs having a far-reaching impact in our country, I am proud to say the work of our detectives in Loudoun County in combination with other DEA Task Force members had an even further impact on the operations of the Sinaloa Cartel,” said Sheriff Chapman. “Our law enforcement community must continue to fight this scourge and protect our citizens, and I am glad that we have such dedicated partners in our law enforcement profession that put their lives on the line every day to do just that,” Sheriff Chapman added.

Operation Angels Envy culminated in one of the largest cumulative takedowns in the area – with 33 individuals charged, and seizure totals of 473 pounds of methamphetamine, 42 kilograms of fentanyl (enough to kill over 21 million people – more than the population of D.C., Maryland, Virginia and surrounding countries, combined), 9 kilograms of heroin, 129 kilograms of cocaine, 5,100 pounds of other drugs, over \$5.3M in US Currency, 114 firearms (many of which were assault-style weapons), and over \$700,000 in jewelry and vehicles.

County Parks & Recreation Receives Three National Awards

The Loudoun County Department of Parks, Recreation and Community Services (PRCS) was recognized for excellence in facility projects and programs completed in 2020 by the National Association of County Park and Recreation Officials (NACPRO) and the National Association of Counties (NACo).



NACPRO recognized the enhancement and redevelopment project at Gwen Thompson Briar Patch Park in Sterling, Virginia, in the Park and Recreation Facility Class I award category for providing outstanding efforts in planning, design, construction and benefits to the community. NACPRO also recognized the PRCS Adaptive Recreation Summer Camp in the Removing Barriers Initiative category as a program that enables and encourages greater participation in parks and recreation by persons with disabilities.

NACo granted the Gwen Thompson Briar Patch Park project an Achievement Award in the category of Parks and Recreation.

"I am proud of the recognition this project and program received, but especially of our staff's commitment to excellence and dedication to the residents of Loudoun County despite challenges from the COVID-19 pandemic," stated PRCS Director Steve Torpy.

The objectives of the enhancements and redevelopment project at Gwen Thompson Briar Patch Park involved the playground redesign with shade structures and new rubber flooring, trail access and replacements, upgrading the tennis court to include pickleball, bridge replacements, and installing retaining walls and the first outdoor fitness court for a PRCS facility.

The summer of 2020 presented many challenges for children with disabilities who rely on consistency and routine. While adhering to COVID-19 mitigation strategies and state requirements, the PRCS adaptive recreation team broke down the barriers that existed for campers with disabilities. Children were able to benefit from play and social interaction in a recreation-based summer experience. Campers increased their self-reliance, enhanced their self-esteem and developed relationships with their peers.






Residential Traffic Calming Guide


